Conservation: The War on Weeds

Fighting the spread of invasive plants in the wild begins at your home. $\ensuremath{\mathsf{Submitted}}\xspace$ by Carrie Minch

When Doreen Cubie as presented with the choice between planting a Bradford pear or a flowering dogwood in her front yard, she selected the pear. Now she knows that was the wrong decision. While both trees may look lovely during springtime, flowering dogwoods – native to eastern deciduous forests – produce berries that ripen in autumn, providing nutritious food for more than 60 bird species. The trees are also host plants for many kinds of caterpillars, which birds need to nourish their young.

Bradford pears, on the other hand, are native to Asia and have very little ecological value in North America – supporting few, if any native insects, and their fruit is merely "junk food" for birds. Even worse, non-native trees can outcompete natives. Bradford pears are now considered weed trees and have spread far

beyond city streets and private yards across much of the easter and midwestern United States. They are so harmful to natural habitats that the state of South Caroline will ban their sale beginning in 2024.

Personal choices can make a big difference in the nation's war on weeds. "People should always plant natives in their yards." Says Jeanne Braha, executive director of the Rock Creek Conservancy, a nonprofit group battling dozens of invasive species that have escaped from yards and gardens into Rock Creek Park, a 1,700 acre urban oasis in Washington, D.C. The intruders include porcelain berry, oriental bittersweet, English ivy, and Chinese wisteria. The non-natives smother spring-blooming ephemerals, such as violets, trout lilies, and mayapples that provide food for mining bees and other early-emerging pollinators.

In Vancouver, British Columbia, a similar group of 700 volunteers (called Ivy Busters) have removed more than 200,000 square feet of English ivy from the city's Stanley Park. They believe it will take more than 50 years to completely ride the park of the aggressive vine.

If volunteering to pull plants is not an option, you can still make a big contribution by simply policing your own yard. The first step is to take out any invasives you may have planted. Hoeing or pulling out plants by the roots is a good option. For smaller invasives you can combine 4 parts vinegar to one part water and use a spray bottle to saturate the weeds. For large areas, smothering the unwanted plants with heavy-duty plastic will work – although it can take several months.

Unfortunately, removing invasives is not a one-time exercise. It has to be done over and over again. If you are looking to purchase native plants, check out Gruler Gardens in Petoskey or the Charlevoix Conservation District Plant Native Sale on September 9.
